MAPC Board Meeting Discussions

The following is a summary of points questioned and discussed at the March MAPC Board Directors' Meeting, regarding ***Ranking of Schools***, based on media attention given to the subject in Manitoba. If you have any further points you would like to add to this list, please contact the MAPC office by email info@mapc.mb.ca. Your points will be presented at the next regular Board meeting.

- Concern about the pitting of one school against another
- Profiles a school as being less than another
- Are the statistics accurate? You need to approach equal numbers in populations to be fair
- Communication process needs to be proactive so parents are made aware of how well their school is doing, not how poorly it compares to another
- Post secondary institutions rank themselves to demonstrate "bang for your buck"
- More emphasis needs to address finding the gaps that evaluations provide, but the impact is harmful when the process becomes competitive
- Universities look at the provincial/divisional marks to address programming needs for training
- Marks differ from school to school
- Schools and divisions must take the time to promote what is unique about what each school offers so parents can make an informed decision about where to send their child
- Is it possible to offer information to parents about programs offered at a particular school without making reference to grades and performance? It's a missing piece of the puzzle for some parents
- Are teachers rewarded for raising the profile of the school through improved grades and attendance? Some jurisdictions throughout the world can be referenced in this practice.
- Is international testing accurate? Are students really giving accurate results?
- The media is guilty of portraying any school rankings based solely on marks. It does not give the complete picture of what that school is all about.

Please note that the results of these discussions are presented to the Minister of Education in person on a semi-annual basis, to ensure that the concerns of parents are heard.

Did you know....

Youth Health Survey

Several years ago, the Manitoba Regional Health Authorities (RHA) recognized a lack of local level data which could be used to address health planning in the province. As a result, they teamed with groups interested in health and created the Partners in Planning for Healthy Living. The group's purpose is to provide RHAs, schools, communities and school divisions with specific information on youth health, with a special focus on risk factors for chronic disease.

As a result, the Youth Health Survey was created from this initiative. Its intent is to provide baseline data on chronic disease risk factors for Manitoba youth in grades 9—12 and to evaluate the Grade 11 and 12 Active Healthy Lifestyles: Physical Education/ Health Education curricula.
